

Residents are urged to separate the debris according to the guideline graphic on the inside of this flyer.

ONLY LOOSE DEBRIS WILL BE COLLECTED, BAGGED DEBRIS SHOULD NOT BE PLACED ON THE PUBLIC RIGHT-OF-WAY

Do not place debris near a water meter vault, fire hydrant or any other above-ground utility. Only debris placed on the public right-of-way will be eligible for collection until further notice.

The graphic on the inside of this page provides residents with a visual overview of the proper method to set debris on the right-of-way.

Southern Recovery Service will make multiple passes through the impacted areas. If residents cannot safely set out debris at this time, or if contractors cannot safely enter submerged areas, additional debris removal passes will be scheduled in the near future. The SCDOT urges all residents to make personal safety a top priority, and only set out debris if it is safe to do so at this time.

DEBRIS REMOVAL GUIDELINES FOR RECENT FLOODING



The South Carolina Department of Transportation (SCDOT) has contracted Southern Recovery Service to begin debris removal on Friday, Oct. 16 in areas impacted by the flooding, including the City of Georgetown.

SCDOT and Southern Recovery Service are currently prioritizing debris removal based on areas that can be safely accessed for debris removal operations. Impacted residents are asked to place any storm-generated debris on the public right-of-way. The public right-of-way is the area of residential property that extends from the street to the sidewalk, ditch, utility pole or easement.

Debris removal guidelines

In efforts to expedite the debris removal process, please follow these rules

Placing debris **near or on trees, poles or other structures** makes removal difficult. This includes fire hydrants and meters.

Debris separation

Please separate debris into the **six categories**, shown below.

Electronics

Television, computer, stereo, phone, DVD player

Large Appliances

Refrigerator, washer/dryer, air conditioner, stove, water heater, dishwasher

Do not leave doors **unsealed or unsecured**

Hazardous waste

Oil, battery, pesticide, paint, cleaning supplies, compressed gas

Vegetative debris

Tree branches, leaves, logs, plants

Construction debris

Building materials, drywall, lumber, carpet, furniture, plumbing

Household garbage

Bagged garbage, discarded food, paper, packaging.

Debris should be placed curbside

10 feet

Debris should not **block roadway**
